## Dinner

On Wednesday evening, at 7 o'clock, a convention dinner-dance will be held in the Hall of Colorado. Herbert S. Sands, Chairman of the General Convention Committee will act as Chairman. J. F. Greenawalt will be the Toastmaster. Addresses will be made by Tyson S. Dines, Director of the United States Chamber of Commerce and President of the Denver Chamber of Commerce, and by Dr. Archer B. Hulbert, of Colorado College. Mr. Dines' subject will be announced at the dinner. Dr. Hulbert's subject is "The Relation of Frontiering to Civilization." Tickets should be obtained at the registration desk where reservations for seating may be made.

## Mountain Trip

On Thursday, June 28, the visitors will enjoy an all-day mountain trip, starting at 8:30 a.m. Denver's Mountain Parks are famous for their beautiful drives and incomparable scenic attractions. From the high points along the way one hundred and fifty miles of the main range of the Rockies will be in view. At least thirty named peaks, with their crests of perpetual snow will be seen. A halt will be made on Lookout Mountain at the grave of Col. William F. Cody, generally known as "Buffalo Bill." A visit will be made to Pahaska Tepee, which contains a museum of relics of the famous scout.

The trip will end at the Cosmopolitan Hotel about 4:30.

# Theater Party

On Thursday evening, at 7:15, members and guests will entrain on special tramway cars in front of the Cosmopolitan Hotel for a theater party at Elitch's Gardens. This is a unique old theater located in a beautiful garden setting. The performance "The Outsider" will be played by a cast of well known actors.

# Golf

There will be a golf tournament on Tuesday, June 26, at the Lakewood Country Club. This will be the 14th annual competition for the Ralph D. Mershon Cup, participation in which is limited to members of the Institute. This cup was donated by Past-President Ralph D. Mershon, and in the event any member wins it twice, it becomes the permanent property of that member. Competition for the cup will be by medal play with full handicap as submitted equalized to the course par. This trophy is awarded to the player making the low net score.

Prizes will also be awarded to the second low net score. All ties will be played off in nine holes of medal play with full handicap as applied to the first nine holes.

There will also be a "Kicker's Handicap," in which the contestant may select in advance of play any handicap he desires, with par to be drawn blind between 70 and 80, and the handicap to be deducted from the gross score. The winner will be the player making his net score equal to or closest to the blind par as drawn.

Additional prizes will be given for the best match play against par, second-best match play against par, low gross score, and the worst gross score. In the event of ties, players will cut for these prizes. Only one prize will be awarded to any individual competitor.

Players will signify their intention to play on the form supplied at time of registering at the Registration Desk. Each player will give his club handicap and the par of his home course; also, the handicap he selects for the "Kicker's Handicap."

Courtesy cars will provide transportation between the hotel and Lakewood.

Green fees of \$2.50 will be payable in advance at the Lakewood Country Club. The same green-fee courtesies will be extended to members during the other days of the convention (wear your badge).

Each player shall keep his own score, cards to be attested by partner and show the player's name legibly, and be turned in to the official scorer at the club house on completion of play. All tournaments will be played under United States Golf Association Rules and local ground rules of Lakewood Country Club.

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# Tennis

The chief tennis play will be for the Ralph D. Mershon Tennis Cup, established in 1923, as an annual trophy. This cup is to become the property of the Institute member winning it twice. The tournament will be started on Tuesday afternoon. Finals will be played on Friday.

Transportation will be furnished and arrangements should be made at the registration desk.

Events will include men's singles and men's doubles, all matches being at scratch, and under U. S. Tennis Association Tournament Rules. Matches will be best two of three sets, including finals. Competition will be limited to members.

Entries will be taken care of at the Registration Desk. There will be prizes for winners and runners-up. Courts not in use for tournament play will be open from 1 to 5 during the convention to members and guests.

# Interesting Points In Denver

Below are listed some places which visitors to Denver always find of unusual interest:

The State Capitol, in a commanding location overlooking the Civic Center. Built of Colorado gray granite; interior finished with Colorado onyx and solid bronze.

South of the Capitol across Fourteenth avenue is the State Museum, containing finest collection of Cliff Dwellers' relics in the world; also, extensive Indian collection.

In the City Park is located the Colorado Museum of Natural History, with a wonderful display of birds and animal life, and a display of mineral exhibits unsurpassed in the country.

In City Park also are located the Thatcher Fountain, a piece of sculpture of unusual artistic appeal, and the monument of Robert Burns.

The Civic Center across Broadway from the capitol grounds contains several objects of architectural and sculptural excellence, the Voorhees Gate on the North and on the South the Greek Theater. Near the theater is a striking bronze figure, the Bucking Broncho.

In Cheesman Park stands the Cheesman Memorial, a replica in pretentious proportions of a Grecian Temple, of Colorado white marble.

Lovers of the beautiful in art will wish to see Denver's art center, the Denver Art Museum, Chappell House. It contains collections of bronze and marble art objects, rare paintings, prints, etchings, etc.

# **Tours Following Convention**

In connection with the convention a most attractive tour of Yellowstone Park and other places has been arranged to start immediately after the convention closes, June 29.

Other enjoyable scenic trips may be taken out of Denver. Probably some who will not take the Yellowstone tour will take some of the other trips after the convention closes. The regular summer excursion rates from points east of the Missouri River include a free side trip to Colorado Springs, the center of the Pike's Peak region, or to Boulder, the gateway to the Glacier district.

Popular Colorado side trips may be as follows:

One-day trips through Boulder and the Glacier Region for \$6.80 and \$9.50.

One-day trip through the Moffat Tunnel, \$6.50

Two-day all-expense auto tour through Rocky Mountain National Park, Big Thompson Canyon and Lookout Mountain, \$33.00.

Three-day all-expense auto tour as above except an extra night spent at Grand Lake, \$39.00.

Attendants will be present at the Cosmopolitan Hotel Headquarters so that reservations and travel information may be available.

# Presentation and Discussion of Papers
