2. The service charges for the use of rooms must be paid in advance to the Willkie Memorial Building. The charge for each session is:

3. We grant no refunds on changes or cancellations made within thirty days of scheduled meeting.

4. The number of people at a meeting cannot exceed the seating capacity for that room, by order of the Fire Department.

5. The building is open from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. daily except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

6. No serving or eating of food is permitted in the first floor Assembly Room or second floor Auditorium. Refreshments may be served in the Conference Room upon payment of a \$2.00 charge for extra cleaning required, in addition to the \$10.00 rental charge.

7. No display posters, etc., may be tacked, glued, or in any way attached to the walls.

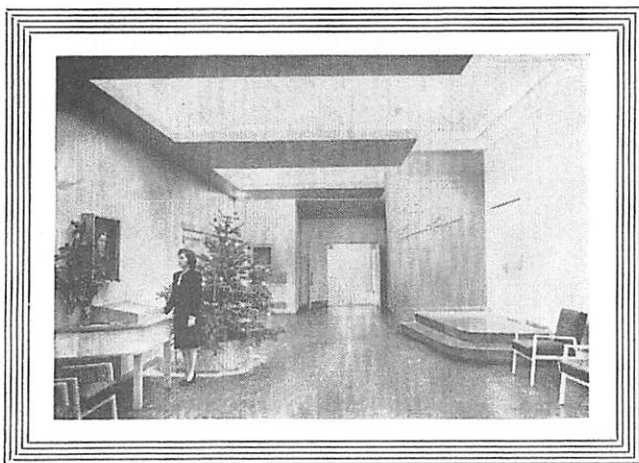

The Willkie Memorial Building was established by Freedom House and dedicated on October 8, 1945, the first anniversary of the death of Wendell L. Willkie

In addition to Freedom House, the organizations which maintain headquarters in this building include: American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service, Anti-Defamation League (and Metropolitan Council) of B'nai B'rith, Citizens Housing and Planning Council of New York, Common Council for American Unity, International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Public Education Association, World University Service, American Institute of Graphic Arts. Many others use the meeting rooms.

What It Does

Freedom House is committed only to the dogma that freedom has become indivisible. Its function is to act as a coordinator, a clearing house, a meeting place. Under one roof in the Willkie Memorial Building, Freedom House and other organizations help and inspire one another to serve the great causes to which they are individually dedicated; organizations which cannot have headquarters here are encouraged to take advantage of the meeting rooms and other facilities.

Much valuable work is carried on at the level of the officers and Board of Directors, who represent the widest range of political, religious and economic interests, but who are committed to the cause of freedom and equal justice for all, at home as well as abroad.

FREEDOM HOUSE is not endowed. It lives on the devoted commitment, the time and energy of its Board members, of its friends in the nation's professional, artistic and industrial life. This is what has made possible, from time to time, the radio programs—local, national and international—the policy statements, conferences, projects, initiatives of one sort or another related to the organization's basic purposes. You may join Freedom House and contribute your strength to that of the thousands of others dedicated to its principles.

Since the work of Freedom House is to interpret the deeper meaning of freedom at home and abroad, it cannot be a pressure group on any one narrow front in the fight for freedom. Other groups carry on special phases of that fight and its purely political aspects must be handled by mass organizations. Many members of Freedom House are also members of such other

groups and can function on the political front, or in special fields, through them.

Why It Was Organized

*"Not for frontiers is this war fought
But on the question: will you die or live?
Are you for the truth or for the lie?
The time of great confusion is over—
A yes shall be a yes again, a no a no!"**

During the dark months prior to America's entry
into the war, at a time when the light of liberty burned
low in Europe, a group of men and women in America
set up a symbol of freedom as a challenge to the Brown
House of Munich, the shrine of Nazism.

Thus, Freedom House, organized in October 1941,
came into being as an expression of man's will to
freedom.

Its organizers hold that freedom, like peace, is a
continuous achievement. Because of our free institu-
tions we live in a glass house where everything we do
has an impact upon our foreign policy. Every lynching
or restrictive covenant or limitation of the right of
asylum diminishes the stature of America as a power
house for freedom. Freedom House therefore favors
the extension of full equality to all people regardless
of color, creed or national origin; it opposes dictator-
ship and the denial of human rights at home and
abroad; it believes that freedom from war must come
through a strengthened United Nations and the rule
of law.
