The demonstration will be in charge of Dr. Harvey Fletcher, Physical Research Director, Bell Telephone Laboratories, Inc., who will describe the essential apparatus of the system and demonstrate its applicability to reproducing, with complete illusion of reality, a variety of sounds includ-
