## THE PROGRAM

The South Wet District of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers is comprised of nine Sections and 14 Student. Branches in the stater of Miesouri, Arhansax, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, and New Mexico. The Mistouri Valley Electric Association operates in the states of lowa, Nebraska, Miseouri, Kansas, and Oklahoma. Both organizations have co-operated in preparing a program of papers on electrical enginecring subjects, which it is thought will be of aid to the war effort. The MVEA usually has a two-day engineering meeting in Kansa* City during the spring of rach year and many of its members are also members of the AIEE. Because of the war it was deemed desirable to hold these meetings concurremly to conserve time and tramsportation.
Both organizations desiring to be of the greatest ponsible service
to the war effort have assembled papers for presentation and discussion relating so far as practicable to the problems of the electrical industry during wartimes. Each orgamization will have separate programs except for two joint sessions which appear in each program. Copies of both programs will be available to all who register.

presentation and discussion of one of the most important matters before the country today, namely, the conservation of critical materials which are so hadly needed in the wat effort. Opportunity will be afforded for discussion to bring out h-lpful ideas relating to these subjects. A general outline of the methods of conserving critical materials is as follows:
A.-Making the greatest possible use of what we have:

1. Increasing extent of use of plant
2. Prolonging life
3. Revtise of material recovered from plant
B.-Limiting additions to and changes in plant to thosz necessaty for essential services.
C.-Making minimum use of critical material in necessary plant extensions:
4. Substitution of less critical matcrials for more critical materials
5. Redesign to use less material
6. Addition of plant for immediate needs only
7. Standardization
D.-Getting back into circulation materials which can be spared:
8. Clean up and dispose of junk
9. Reduction of inventories
10. Taking materials out of working plant

This will afford a splendid opportunity to become acquainted with the older members of the electrical industry and to learn of AIEE affairs from the several talks which will be made by officers of the Instirute.
