

Jobs for engineers are becoming increasingly scarce. As more and more of us either lose our jobs, or fear that we will be the victims of the next cut-backs, we realize that we have in the past been enjoying a false prosperity. It was a prosperity built on doing unnecessary work, on socially non-productive projects. These projects have drained our country of needed resources and channelled our talents into directions that we as individuals face difficulties in changing.

The 1.1 million engineers in this country are the largest group of productive and creative people not to have an organization that serves their needs. We have repeatedly been told that we are professionals and that our professional society (the IEEE) is the organization we should join and support. The IEEE has not served the real needs of its membership, it has relegated the interests of the working engineer to meaningles gestures, its statements (recent Spectrum article by outgoing President Granger) are an affront to its members.

The Committee for Social Responsibility in Engineering challenges the IEEE to:

- -protest the economic interest of its members by providing a strong national voice for an engineering policy, conceived from reason and national needs instead of whim and fancy.
 - -help eliminate unemployment instead of merely instructing us in resume writing for nonexistent jobs.
 - -protect the economic interests of its members by instituting vested pensions.
 - -support and protect its members who refuse to work on projects that are harmful to humanity.
- -allow working engineers to replace the self-perpetuating elitist group from upper management that now econtrols the society.
 - -democratize its procedures, with elections that are other than farcical.
